Co Editor Note

The following is a reprint of a biography of Walter Reuther compiled by Region 8 Webmaster John Davis. This is the first portion of the biography and for the sake of space in the paper we will reprint the end of the biography in a future edition. Walter Reuther served as President of the UAW from 1946 until his death in 1970. Walter Reuther was committed to working people and fought tirelessly throughout his lifetime to improve the rights and compensation of working class Americans both at the bargaining table and in the halls of Congress.

Walter Reuther was born in Wheeling, West Virginia on September 01, 1907, the second of five children. His father was a union driver for a brewery and had immigrated to America from Germany. His father instilled in his boys the importance of unions and their responsibility to be at the forefront of social and economic justice.

Reuther dropped out of high school and completed an apprenticeship in tool and die work. After being fired for trying to organize a union at his shop in West Virginia, he moved to Detroit and was hired at Ford's River Rouge plant. Earning a reputation as an excellent mechanic, Walter Reuther completed his high school diploma in 1922 and began taking classes at Detroit City College (now Wayne State). He was soon joined in Detroit by his brothers Roy and Victor who also enrolled in Detroit City College. The Great Depression consolidated the political and social activism of the Brothers Reuther and they formed a Social Problems Club on the campus. The group protested many of the injustice policies of the being practiced around the city including the segregationist policies of the local swimming pool.

The next year Walter and Victor left Detroit to tour the world, ending up working at a Ford facility in Russia. He returned to Detroit in 1935 and fell in love with a pretty physical education teacher named May Wolf. They were married in 1936.

That same year Walter Reuther began his rise through the ranks of the union. He first joined Local 86, which represented workers at GM's Temstadt parts plant even though he didn't work there. He went on to be elected as a delegate to the 1936 UAW national convention where his speaking skills led to his election to the International Executive Board.

Next Reuther was elected President of UAW Local 174 an amalgamated local representing 76 shops and 30,000 workers. He helped play a key role in planning the successful sit-down strikes that brought the UAW to GM in Flint, Michigan. These strikes were successful in winning union recognition at both GM and Chrysler but Ford had resisted organization. On May 26, 1937 Walter Reuther and several other union activist were handling out material on the overpass from the parking lot at Ford's River Rough plant when they were severely beaten by Ford thugs. Newspapers caught the event and the brutality shown by Ford made the headlines nationwide. The event became known as "The Battle of the Overpass" and brought national attention to the struggles that workers were facing to win the right for union representation.

In 1939 Reuther became the director of the UAW's GM Department and was elected the union's first vice-president in 1942. In 1940 Reuther suggested converting excess capacity in the auto industry to military production. President Roosevelt had called on the nation to take an "Arsenal of Democracy" stance to prepare for war and Walter Reuther was in complete agreement. Corporations argued against the idea, not wanting to give up any portion of their business. After the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, Reuther's vision of the auto industry turning out 500 planes a day became a reality. President Roosevelt became friends with the UAW leader and asked him to participate on a number of wartime boards. The friendship between the Both Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt and Walter and May Reuther would last the remainder of their lives.

The President's Report

I hope all of our members enjoyed their UAW negotiated Christmas holidays by either enjoying the time off or picking up PAA days for the spring. Paid holidays were won in 1947, a little known fact in our Union's rich history.

As predicted our January sales were up 2 percent selling about 40,000 more vehicles over January 2018 sales. Retail sales for the month were 104,290 vehicles, and fleet sales totaled 31,792 accounting for 23 percent of total sales for the month. Ram brand sales were up 24 percent to 39,649 vehicles. This was Ram brands highest January ever. Trucks jumped 19 percent to 34,889. Despite the cold weather this January, Jeep sales finished at 13,024 vehicles. The Jeep Compass set a January sales record selling 10,298 vehicles.

We are definitely going to be busy this year with the contract negotiations coming up. Your bargaining committee appreciates all of the proposals put in by you, the membership. Your voices will be heard. I think it is safe to say the leadership of this great Local does everything within our power to strengthen our contracts to give you the justice you have earned and deserve. Throughout the years I have served as a union official, I've seen many changes in the company and in our union. I still firmly believe that this company's success comes from the sisters and brothers of the UAW. There is no doubt in my mind that there are some in management that

think it would be a better a company without the union.

People that choose to undermine the union use the same old union busting tactics. Those tactics didn't work then and won't work now. One of their favorite tricks is to whipsaw the membership creating controversy on the shop floor. Such as the FCA Standard of Conduct items 8, 11, and 14 any of which the end result could be termination. We as union members are a family and families argue just do not do it on the shop floor or company property. To that point however, anything outside of the company property is still subject to discipline if the issue started at the plant.

Another issue that is coming up often lately are tardy disciplines and terminations. It is our responsibility as members to know where we are in the attendance programs. If you have served a 3 day discipline for your 4th tardy, the next step 5 is a 30 day disciplinary layoff (DLO), and the 6th and final is a termination. I AM NOT SAYING IN ANYWAY SHAPE OR FORM TO MISS WORK, but if you're not in the attendance procedure it would be better to take an attendance hit and miss one day than to be terminated for a tardy. It would be much easier on the bank account. If you don't know where you are at with your attendance then go to your dashboard, if you don't know how, ask

a sister or a brother or your steward.

It is imperative for us as union members to stick together. Telling on each other plays



right into management's hands. United we negotiate, divided we will surely fail. President Theodore Roosevelt said, "It is essential that there should be organization of labor. Capital organizes and therefore labor must organize." Franklin D. Roosevelt stated that if he went to work in a factory the first thing he would do is join the union, nothing has changed. Abraham Lincoln stated, "If any man tells you he loves America, yet hates labor, he is a liar. If any man tells you he trusts America, yet fears labor, he is a fool."

Sisters and brothers, we have what we have because of the UAW, not in spite of it. We have safety in the workplace, our kids can attend good schools, we make living wages and have good healthcare. Labor unions represent the middle class and the poor. Unions protect American jobs, but with the loss of power we are weakened. Labor unions built this great country and made America strong. Get active in our great union, and help make us stronger. Once again, thank you for allowing me to be your President!



2018 Tax Law Changes

Greetings:

The purpose of this article is to provide information on changes in Tax Law that may affect your 2018 Tax Return. For additional information on the changes go www.irs.gov and enter Pub 5307 in search box.

Starting 2018 Standard Deduction are: Single \$12000, Married filing jointly. Qualifying widower \$24000, Married filing separately \$12000, and Head of household \$18000. The amounts are higher if you or your spouse are blind or over age 65.

Limit on overall itemized deductions suspended: This means that...if you do itemize...your itemized deductions are no longer limited if your adjusted gross income is over a certain amount.

Deduction for medical and dental expenses modified: This means if you do itemize...you can deduct the part of your eligible medical and dental expenses that is more than 7.5 percent of your 2018 adjusted gross income. For tax year 2019 the amount of qualified expenses must exceed 10% of adjusted gross income in order to be deductible.

Deduction for state and local income, sales and property taxes modified. This means that if you do itemize... you can deduct state and local income, sales, and property taxes but only up to \$10000 (\$5000 if Married Filing Separate)

Deduction for home mortgage and home equity interest modified. This means that...if you itemize. That interest paid on most home equity loans is not deductible

unless the loan proceeds were used to buy, build, or substantially improve your main home or second home.

Limit for charitable contributions modified. The limit on charitable contributions of cash has increased from 50 percent to 60 percent of your adjusted gross income. This means you may be able to deduct more of your charitable cash contributions this year.

Miscellaneous itemized deductions suspended: This means that if you do itemize. If your miscellaneous itemized deductions previously needed to exceed 2% of your adjusted gross income, they ae no longer deductible. Miscellaneous items include Union Dues, tax preparation fees.

Deduction for personal exemptions suspended: For 2018 you can't claim a personal exemption deduction for yourself, your spouse, or your dependents. This means that...you will not be able to reduce the income that is subject to tax by the exemption amount for each person included on your tax return as you have in previous years.

Child tax credit and additional child tax credit.
For 2018 the maximum credit increased to \$2000 per qualifying child. Up to \$1400 of the credit can be refundable for each qualifying child as the additional child tax credit. In addition, the income threshold at which child tax credit begins to phase out in increased to \$200.000, or \$400,000 if married filing jointly. This means more families with children under 17 qualify for the larger credit.
