The President's Report

Brother and Sisters,

First off, I want to honor and thank those who have served our country currently and in the past. I also want to honor and thank their families because it effects them just as much if not more, especially when they're away defending our country and freedom. As a country, we sometimes take our freedom for granted and forget about the lives that have been taken to defend our freedom. Please take the time to thank a veteran and give them the honor they deserve.

I hope everyone enjoyed their Easter holiday weekend and were able to spend some quality time with their families. The pace of the plants has kind of slowed due to the microchip/semi-conductor supply issues to the assembly plants. As I am writing this, the 9-speed and SIEVT are experiencing down weeks once again this year, due to this issue. The 6-speed is scheduled to wind down towards the end of May. The 8-speed/68RFE is still running strong and no down weeks have been mentioned to us due to this issue.

The Kokomo Engine Plant is on schedule to launch in October, and we should see more people moved

in the coming months as this launch ramps up. The Company's strategy is to funnel all the microchips/semiconductors to the high-profit vehicles (RAM and Jeep) that are selling and to keep those assembly plants up and running. This strategy must be working because the sales were up in the first quarter compared to last year. Hopefully, this trend continues for our sales so we can have another great union negotiated profit-sharing check in 2022.

I want to make some of you aware that may not know that American Food and Vending (AFV) employees are members of Local 685. So please support these brothers and sisters, and utilize the services that they provide for our membership. Currently, we are working with Joe Butcher the Chairperson for AFV, and the AFV Management to expand more options and provide service for the off-shifts. With anticipation, we will see these changes come to fruition sooner than later because AFV has several employees that have been laid off since Covid-19 hit in March of 2020, so they can be gainfully employed once again.

We received a letter from the International Union on April 8th notifying all of the Locals that all



Union meetings/functions will be suspended until after June 30th. This is very unfortunate because we need to have membership meetings so we can start returning things to somewhat normality. Chris and I will continue to do our podcasts to keep the membership informed.

The FCA clinic will be offering Covid-19 vaccinations starting April 12th for FCA employees and their immediate family members. You must go online and schedule your appointment at https://fca.fyi/vaccine. Please stay healthy and enjoy the summer!





The Local Union Civil and Human Rights Committee is charged with the responsibility of assisting the Local Union leadership in the implementation of the UAW "No Discrimination" Policy. The role of the Local Union Civil and Human Rights Committee is to assist, educate,

In the next several articles, various information, such as terms, definitions and policies will be shared, to increase awareness and involvement.

"Questions & Answers on Anti-Discrimination Laws"

Q: Do the anti-discrimination laws protect only women and minorities?

A: No. The anti-discrimination laws protect all workers from employment decisions based on protected status. Thus, if an employer pays a female worker better wages than a male worker performing the same job, that employer has discriminated against the male worker based on his sex, in violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Similarly, if an Asian-American worker who misses three days of work is suspended but a Caucasian worker who misses three days of work is fired, then the Caucasian worker has been discriminated against based on race.

Q: How do I know I know if an action is discriminatory in violation of the law?

A: First, not all discriminatory actions are forbidden by law. The law only prohibits discrimination when it is based on a person's protected status ____ race, color, religion, national origin, sex (including pregnancy, sexual orientation, or gender identity), age (40 or older), and disability and genetic information under federal law (including family medical history).

Q: Besides hiring, what other aspects of the employment relationship are regulated by the antidiscrimination laws?

A: The laws regulate all aspects of work, including hiring, firing, promotions, job duties, wages, benefits, and reviews. Generally speaking, the laws do not require an employer to provide specific benefits, to institute job review procedures, or to draw up job descriptions. Rather, the employer is allowed to establish its own policies so long as they are applied to all employees in a non-discriminatory manner and so long as the policies do not have the effect of discriminating against a protected class.

Your UAW Local 685 Civil Rights Committee has faith you will find this sampling of common asked questions to be useful and educational. Knowledge is a key to all barriers, let us all pledge to continued growth and solidarity.


