The role of the committee is to assist, educate, and mobilize Local Union members and leaders in the elimination of all forms of discrimination in the workplace and community.

60 years have passed since the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. It's obviously most famous for Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech. And the best-known part of that speech is King's words expressing hope that his children "will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character."

In a sense, it's understandable that one of the greatest works of oratory in American history has overshadowed the rest of the day.

Nevertheless, it's striking how much the "jobs" part of the March on Washington has dropped out of memory — because that was absolutely core to the message the marchers wanted the rest of the country to hear.

Start with the day's program, which included a 10-point section called "What We Demand." Number one is "comprehensive and effective civil rights legislation" that guarantees not just the right to vote, but also "decent housing."

Number seven is "a massive federal program to train and place all unemployed workers — negro and white — on meaningful and dignified jobs at decent wages."

Number eight is "a national minimum wage act that will give all Americans a decent standard of living. (Government surveys show that anything less than \$2.00 an hour fails to do this.)" At the time, the minimum wage was \$1.15, or the equivalent today, adjusted for inflation, of \$11.45. \$2.00 an hour would now be about \$20. The actual federal minimum wage today is \$7.25.

Even more succinctly, one of the most popular placards carried by marchers read, "Civil Rights plus full employment equals freedom."

John Lewis, who was then chair of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, spoke before King. He began by saying:


All over this nation, the Black masses are on the march for jobs and freedom, but we have nothing to be proud of. Hundreds and thousands of our brothers are not here, for they are receiving starvation wages or no wages at all. While we stand here, there are sharecroppers in the Delta of Mississippi who are out in the fields working for less than three dollars a day, 12 hours a day.

He went on to explain that while the march supported the Kennedy administration's proposed civil rights bill, it was insufficient. "We need," he stated, "a bill that will provide for the homeless and starving people of this nation."

Walter Reuther, the president of the United Auto Workers. In his speech, he referenced the low rates of unemployment during World War II and told the crowd:

If we can have full employment, and full production for the negative ends of war, then why can't we have a job for every American in the pursuit of peace? And so, our slogan has got to be fair employment, but fair employment within the framework of full employment, so that every American can have a job.

A. Philip Randolph, the founder of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car



Porters and one of the key organizers of the march. It's well worth reading what he said, because Randolph addressed head on the most profound questions of American society:

We have no future in a society in which six million Black and white people are unemployed and millions more live in poverty. Nor is the goal of our civil rights revolution merely the passage of civil rights legislation. ... Yes, we want a fair employment practice act, but what good will it do if profit-geared automation destroys the jobs of millions of workers, Black and white?

The sanctity of private property takes second place to the sanctity of the human personality. It falls to the Negro to reassert this proper priority of values, because our ancestors were transformed from human personalities into private property. It falls to us to demand new forms of social planning, to create full employment, and to put automation at the service of human needs, not at the service of profits ...

The March on Washington is not the climax of our struggle, but a new beginning, not only for the Negro, but for all Americans who thirst for freedom and a better life. Look for the enemies of Medicare, of higher minimum wages, of Social Security, of federal aid to education and there you will find the enemy of the Negro, the coalition of Dixiecrats and reactionary Republicans that seek to dominate the Congress.

So, once you understand the core purpose of the March on Washington, it's clear that its dream remains, at best, half fulfilled. While segregation and discrimination still exist, they at least have been formally dismantled. But in economic terms, we have if anything, gone backward. The federal minimum wage is less in real terms than it was in 1963. The idea of a federal jobs guarantee is barely even discussed. The chair of the Federal Reserve talks openly about the need to decrease the number of available jobs.

If the marchers 60 years ago were correct, this agenda will have to be recovered if African Americans, and Americans in general, are going reach genuine freedom. End of excerpt

Interestingly, history has a way of repeating itself, the discussions of

wages, automation destroying jobs, Medicare, Social Security, the need for training, and the greed that generates these issues, certainly reflect our current position. Solidarity is our best served tool "Solidarity Forever."

Hopefully, by the time this article is released, our strike is over, and we have secured a fair contract. We hope you enjoyed this article and found something enlightening or interesting that serves to impact your thoughts in a positive way. Remember that this was a long time ago and some words, terms, and references we don't use these days. Have a safe and enjoyable Winter season.

On Sunday, August 13, 10 delegates from UAW Local 685 ascended to The Walter and May Reuther UAW Family Education Center, more commonly known as Black Lake, for the National UAW Veterans Conference. The focus, this year was

Women's History in the Military. "True Courage- Strong Defense."

Women have been serving in the United States Military in any capacity imaginable since the American Revolution. As nurses, doing laundry, cooks, spies, even soldiers in disguise, you name it. Women have been finding unofficial roles for themselves since this country's origin up until June 1948, when President Harry S. Truman signed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act. This year marked the 75th anniversary of that Act and Matt Uptmor the UAW International Director Health, and Safety stated that "We've come a long way, but we still have a long way to go." Delegates from all over the country came together to listen to guest speakers like Ashley Lewis from the UAW Women's Department and host of 'Talk about it Wednesdays'. Christina Mariana and Katrina Grace Beshears from the VA's S.A.V.E. program spent the week in fellowship with us after their presentation on Monday. Allison Jaslow spoke before lunch and earned brownie points with the audience by keeping her presentation fast paced and to the point. She led more of a discussion format to take questions from delegates fighting for benefits they deserve.

RADAR REPORT

During the week, my two favorite speakers were easy picks. First, Region 9 Director, IEB Member, and Marine- Daniel Vicente. After Army Veteran Matt Uptmor presented a welcome gift of brand-new Crayola crayons, he opened his speech with, "Effin' Army guys." This led to roars of laughter and applause, and he had our full attention. Following up, a female disabled Army Veteran and founder of Final Salute, INC., Podcaster, Author, and Documentary Star- Jaspen Boothe. Jas, who immediately said, "I'm married to a Marine Corp Veteran...pray for me...um...", I was brought into the UAW fold by Region 4's Horace Hubbard. Everyone knows Horace, or at least you should. His drive, heart, and passion for the mission matches his larger-than-life personality. Jas turned her story into inspiration for anyone feeling the struggle. She faced insurmountable obstacles and overcame them step by step, paving the way for over 5,000 homeless female Veterans to date. Jas also shared a valuable life lesson from her book club in the early 2010's- Don't make stuff up and if the author is E.L. James, S&M does not mean social media...ever.

As with tradition, UAW Director of Health & Safety, UAW National Veterans Department Assistant Director, Administrative Assistant to the President's Office, and Army Veteran, Matt Uptmor opened and closed the conference. Matts understanding of the goals and mission of this annual conference carrying his from Saginaw to Onaway every year to remind us that we should not have any homeless Veterans in the United States, we should be voting on legislation that directly benefits



Veterans, and no matter your age or identifying gender.


