# **Local 685 Employee Assistance Program**

## Topic: Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD)

Seasonal Affective Disorder is sometimes called seasonal depression, because it is a form of depression that aligns with the changes of seasons. As we approach the winter months, the days get shorter and colder. Some people may begin having depressive symptoms, which go away in the spring when the days are longer and warmer. This is called a winter depression pattern. Other people may experience the opposite pattern, meaning their depressive symptoms develop in the spring and summer, but resolve as the weather cools in the fall. This is called summer depression pattern. The National Institute of Mental Health warns that "The depression associated with SAD is related to changes in daylight hours, not the calendar, so stresses associated with the holidays or predictable seasonal changes in work or school schedules, family visits, and so forth are not the same as SAD." Not all people diagnosed with depression will experience every symptom; however, the symptoms they do feel are often severe enough to adversely affect their daily activities. Treatment options with a mental health professional are available to reduce the severity of symptoms, and possibly reverse the effects of some symptoms as well.

Common symptoms of depression may include:

- Persistent sadness/emptiness daily for at least 2 weeks
- · Hopelessness or pessimism
- · Irritability, frustration, restlessness
- Guilt, worthlessness, helplessness
- Loss of interest or pleasure in normally fun activities
- · Low energy, fatigue
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering, or making decisions
- · Changes in sleep, appetite, or unplanned weight changes
- Unexplained physical ailments, aches, pains, cramps, or digestive issues
- · Thoughts of death, suicidal ideation, or suicide attempts

I would like to thank The UAW Local 685 for allowing me to attend various workshops on Civil and Human Rights.



I personally learned that PTSD, while related to many of our service men and women, can also affect so many other individuals. It can have such a huge impact on family life, on the lives of children, spouses, extended family and friendships. We all experience traumatic experiences or life events that can lead to developing PTSD. We learned the importance of being aware of the mental health of those around us, our loved ones and coworkers, so that we can identify the need for mental health checks and encourage someone in need to seek help. Sometimes it takes a kind word, a smile, or just making sure that someone knows that they are important in the lives of others to keep them from taking drastic measures when they are feeling that there is no way out. Making those resources known is crucial, especially in crisis situations. We are fortunate to have our EAP reps on site, access to various counseling centers, and the big support system we have within our membership.
