The local negotiations started on Monday, August 7th. I believe your bargaining committee will bring back the best local contract for the membership.

vote, strike votes must be submitted to International by end of day Thursday August 24th. You can see things are moving quickly and on September 14, 2023, there will be no more time. When this newsletter comes out, we will be in the middle of planning for a strike and remember, nobody benefits from a strike. However, it is a powerful tool that we have in this great union.

I understand that there is a lot of propaganda coming from the Company. I want every one of our members to stop and think about what the Company has gave us. NOTHING! Everything that we have has been a fight to get and we owe our retirees a big thank you for taking on that fight long ago.

UAW Local 685 Financial Secretary, the Community Service Chair, and I were in Detroit on August 16-17th for Strike Benefit Classes. We will be having several informational meetings, be sure to attend. I want to make sure that the membership always stays informed on what to do in the event that we do go out on strike.

1. All members must be on some kind of strike duty. The entrances are our number one priority. This is why the strike packets are put out and we need to always get at least four members on each entrance. To receive the strike benefits EVERYONE must be assigned to strike duty. So please if we do go out on strike make sure you get with the hall and we will get you assigned.

- 2. Make sure your information at the hall is updated and correct. This information must be correct in order for you to receive your benefits. If it is not correct, it will slow your process of strike benefits.
- 3. If we do walk out, please shut down the machines in the way that they are supposed to be shut down, get all your belongings, and leave in a safe manner.
- 4. There will be a few Union members that will still have to report to work. They will have placards so you will know who they are. Believe me, they would much rather be out with us.

Please make sure you attend the informational meetings and ask questions; I guarantee we will not have all the answers. However, will get them as quickly as we can. Just remember that going out on strike can be a very stressful time, especially if we are out for an extended time. I recommend we all pull together and stand united. Brothers and Sisters, this is the time where we need to stop all the bickering, complaining, and pull together to stand in Solidarity. We cannot be defeated if we all join forces together and stand as one!


Local 685 Education Committee






A note as I leave Stellantis,

I, as many of you, never had a dream while growing up to work in a factory. After bouncing around from job to job after my tour of duty in the Air Force, I landed a job at KTP. The pay was really good in comparison to what most folks made in 1988. I started out at \$11.65 an hour. The working conditions were dirty, hot, and the place had that pungent smell that will permeate your clothes to this day. Most of us have said, as hog farmers say about the hog stench, that it is the "smell of money." My wife would wash my work clothes separate from the family to keep that smell away. We also had many safety issues back then that our union has fought hard to address, and in doing so has made great strides. Our shop floors are much safer than ever before.

I have been in all our Kokomo plants and have been in nearly all aspects of our jobs here. I spent the longest stretch of my 31 years at ITP in Dept 5400 as a team member, jobsetter and finally a team leader. As some of you already know, when I transferred to the Tipton Plant in 2014, I applied for and got an appointed job as the Production LTTC / Tuition Assistance person. This job also made me the UAW Quality Joint Pillar Lead for the plant over WCM activities. Once I earned the appointed position from the IUAW, I went upstairs and introduced myself to my management counterpart Ted Wiles who was the Quality Center Manager at Tipton. I said, "Ted, I have never worked in Quality, but I'm willing to learn." Ted then said something that changed how I thought. He said, "Leon, while being a team leader did you ever have a quality issue with your parts that you had to resolve through sorting/finding a clean point to ensure your customer didn't receive defective material"? I affirmed that Yes, I had on several occasions had to sort through gears that maybe had broach tears or out of round material, and even had to go to assembly on occasion and look through the sub lines to make sure defective material didn't get out. Ted then said this....."Leon, we ALL work in Quality. Quality isn't just a department, it's a mindset." He went on to say that it is "each of our duties is to ensure that every part coming off of our line to be in tolerance and of the best quality that we can produce each and every day....and that really we all worked for Quality!"



I would like to encourage all of you to give your very best each and every day. We aren't perfect, but we can all work with excellence in mind. Treat every part as if it is going into your own vehicle or the vehicle you entrust your family to drive. The killer client theory used to be that when one person who had a warranty issue would tell ten people and then those ten would tell another ten people. With Facebook and other public media, that number is now one person telling thousands when they post a negative experience. We must be mindful that we won't have repeat customers if bad habits continue and that our jobs could be directly and adversely affected.

I have made many wonderful friends through the years, so I won't mention any by name as to not leave anyone out, but I will miss all of you, well most of you.... LOL. We have learned much together through the years. We have had many laughs and sometimes tears, but we have for the most part stood together through thick and thin. Hang tough during these next few months as our new contract is negotiated. Shawn Fain and his counterparts have their work cut out for them, but I believe our union brothers and sisters will come out on top in the end. May God bless all of you through the remainder of your career here at Stellantis.


